I was struck by this commitment and passion for music on Bach's part. I started speculating about what might have gone through his mind on this journey. First I guessed he might have been thinking about his career and his contributions to music inventing the well-tempered scale and such. Getting a little more whimsical, I saw him looking into the future, comparing himself to other composers maybe getting a little jealous of Handel.
